Report of Television Studies Section

Summary:

The Television Section has had a particularly successful year full of activity and development. We are now working in collaboration with *Critical Studies in Television* and have organised two events. Our membership has reached over 180, and our facebook group has seen increased traffic.

Activities in 2013:

Conferences:

The Television Studies Section was involved in the organisation of two conferences in the year 2013. This included the joint-conference with the Temporary Working Group Media Industries and Cultural Production. The conference 'Making Television for the 21st Century' took place 24-26 October 2013 at Aarhus University, Denmark. The conference was attended by approx. 50 delegates who listened to a total of 35 papers. The keynote was provided by John T. Caldwell who spoke about 'Spec-World, Craft-World, Brand-World'. There was also a plenary panel, bringing together Lothar Mikos, David Hesmondhalgh and Lotte Lindegaard, the head of TV2 in Denmark. The conference was also used by the section for its annual business meeting.

The second conference, the Television Studies Section was involved with was 'The Place of Public Service Broadcasting: Transnationalism, Localism and Identity in the Digital Age', held at the University of York, 4 July 2013. The Television Studies Section organised a specialist panel on Public Service Television in the Online Sphere which included three papers by Pernilla Serverson, Malmö University, Tanya Kant, University of Sussex, and Elke Weissmann, Edge Hill University. The conference attracted approximately 25 delegates.

Activities in Relation to the Journal:

The year 2013 also saw the beginning of the collaborations with *Critical Studies in Television*, the Manchester University Press-based journal. The journal editorial team now includes two section members – Simone Knox and Elke Weissmann. Moreover, the board of corresponding editors has

The journal has been expanded to include 3 issues and reflects the broad spread of topics covered by researchers in our section. Each year, there will be two general and one themed issue. The first contribution by ECREA members was the special issue on TV Formats guest edited by section member Andrea Esser from Roehampton University. The issue was entitled Media Across Borders (Vol. 8, no. 2).

ECREA and *Critical Studies in Television* been pro-active to make books written in languages other than English available to a wider audience and has commissioned several reviews of books published in languages other than English. The reviews are available both in English and in the language in which the book was originally published. These are now filtering into the hardcopy and the online copy of Critical Studies in Television. The book reviews published so far include:

We now also have a regular blog spot on the Critical Studies in Television website. The blog attracts approximately 6000 readers every week. It will be edited by David Leventes Palatinus. The first blog has already been published and was written by Katerina Serafeim (see http://cstonline.tv/greek-puiblic-television).
